**Awards and competitions – GSAG Student Paper Competition and GSAG Student Research Award:**

We plan to offer more than one award again in the coming year. Although, rather than using our funds for a student paper of research competition, we will award support for travel for members.

Last year \$1,000 was distributed in total to the three winners of the research award and \$300 was distributed to two winners of the paper competition before the 2012 annual meeting.

- Finally, we are looking to partner with other specialty groups that are interested in working with GSAG to develop common themes and conference plans for the future.
- We will again hold our paper award and research grant competitions.
